Ray Koon, speaking through the video link and stationed at Camp Fallujah in Iraq, said a rededication ceremony was something he and his wife had always dreamed of doing on their 10th anniversary.

"I told Melody, this isn't exactly the way I wanted to do it, but how many people can say they renewed their vows over a video conference when one of the spouses is in a war zone?" said Ray Koon, a NCIS training instructor at FLETC.

"I just can't describe what it means to me to be able to renew our vows like we had promised each other when we first got married."

The bride wore Capri pants and there weren't any wedding bells chiming in the background, but it was a wedding just the same.

It just happened, though, to fall during Ray Koon's second deployment to the Mideast.

Melody Koon said it was just exciting to see her husband on screen.

"Ray actually came up with the idea. I just showed up, basically," said Melody Koon, standing in the director's conference room on the FLETC campus, where the ceremony took place.

And a second honeymoon?

If it happens, it will have to wait.

"Ray is coming home May 10," she said. "We haven't planned a second honeymoon yet, we're just waiting for him to come home."
